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
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

Wren was confused how Saguaro knew this was happening to his family on the other side of the mountain when he remained in the same spot every day.








Melanie realized quickly that she was on top of a cactus! She looked down and saw that she wasn't her normal self, she was a bird!





Melanie began to fly and felt so free.




She started seeing the trees as her new playground, singing songs and having fun. She even started making friends. She realized that many trees, bushes, and cacti were where her new friends lived.

She told her dad that he couldn't build there. He told her that if that would cheer her up then he wouldn't do it.




Wren was doing her usual routine flying from cacti to bushes, when she noticed that the people from the construction company were starting to leave.

Glossary

Biosemiotics: The way that plants and animals talk/communicate with each other by non-spoken language (codes and signals).

Environment: The surrounding area in which many communities live.

Ecosystem: A community within an environment in which species live and interact with each other.

Keystone Species: A species that provides food and shelter to other animals and keeps ecosystems together.

Migration: When a group of species move to a different place because of the weather or for food.

Extinct: When a group of species no longer exists.
